A total of 35 government appointed organisations from 24 EU Member States, Norway and Croatia and a large number of regional agencies and non-for-profit organisations that produce or contribute to HTA

To put into practice an effective and sustainable HTA collaboration in Europe that brings added value at the European, national and regional level



EUnetHTA Joint Action 2010-12

Focus on HTA in Europe to

- facilitate efficient use of resources available for HTA,
- create a sustainable system of HTA knowledge sharing, and
- promote good practice in HTA methods and processes
- Budget: € 5.959.525
- Work progresses according to plans with few adjustments to timelines

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Directive on Cross-border Healthcare

Article 15 Cooperation on health technology assessment

1. The Union shall support and facilitate cooperation and the exchange of <u>scientific</u> information among Member States within a voluntary network connecting <u>national authorities or bodies</u> <u>responsible for health technology assessment</u> designated by the Member States.... That network shall be based on the principle of good governance including transparency, objectivity, independence of expertise, fairness of procedure and appropriate stakeholder consultations

The Directive on CBHC

The Directive n°2011/24/EU of the **European Parliament and of the Council of** 9 March 2011 on the application of patients' rights in cross-border healthcare entered into force on 24th **April 2011. Its transposition period of 30** months will end on 25th October 2013. By then, Member States are required to have adopted all necessary measures to transpose the Directive into national legislation.
